

## **Select Board Report** by Marcia Hamilton

The select board meets every second and fourth Thursday at the Town Office, unless otherwise noted. The new start time of 6:00 p.m. has gone into effect until further notice.

The Town is still involved with the aftermath of Tropical Storm Irene. The Select Board met with Elizabeth McEwen, an advocate for people with long term Tropical Storm Irene unmet needs, from Southeast Vermont Community Action (SEVCA), to discuss work being done for some homeowners on Augur Hole Road. The Board also met with the Town Service Officer, Robin White who is also involved in helping residents of this town and others in the recovery process.

The Board has been working with a river management engineer, for stream bank stabilization and debris removal of Branch Brook on Augur Hole Road. A special bid opening meeting led to the acceptance of a bid to repair the Collins Road Bridge, which is expected to be completed by fall. The Board discussed town roads with David Elliott, Road Foreman who reported on current highway conditions and his plans for future maintenance.

Glenn Herrin, Emergency Management Director, reported his efforts to establish a Neighborhood Network. The idea was raised at Town Meeting when a call for volunteers was made by Lucy Gratwick, former Select Board member. Look for an article with more information from Glenn here in this issue.

The Board appointed Adam Katrick Animal Control Officer. He spent many years studying animal behavior and biology, primarily with canines. He is a graduate of Marlboro College and is an Emergency Medical Technician with the Marlboro Volunteer Fire Company. He is a carpenter with Mindel and Morse Builders, LLC. His phone number is 802-272-0093. Adam will be attending a new training program made possible through generous grants from the Vermont Humane Federation, the Humane Society of the United States and the American Society for the Prevention and Cruelty to Animals.

Thanks to the junior high school students under Rachel Boyden and Tim Hayes, the recycling center area has been kept clean and the bins have been emptied.

Conceptually, Neighborhood Networks form a tree with six geographic Areas divided into approximately 20 Neighborhoods of 15-25 households each.

## Hogback Trails Update

White's Loop Trail on the Hogback Mountain Conservation Area's north side has been re-routed. To access White's Loop please proceed, as in the past, from the informational kiosk at the northeast corner of the north parking lot to Old Hogback Road (this access path is marked with orange flagging). Upon reaching Old Hogback Road, turn right. About 60 feet up the road, on your left, is the new White's Loop entry point, indicated with a sign. The re-routed section maintains the white rectangle blazes.

Please note that the MES Cut-off Trail's blue rectangle blazes now have white dots in the center of the blazes. This not only improves their visibility, but also makes clear that the MES Cut-off is a component of White's Loop Trail that provides a

shorter loop for those who do not wish to travel the full loop.

We are presently working to coordinate the Conservation Area's trail system with Molly Stark State Park's Mt. Olga Loop Trail and the Deerfield Valley Trail System. A "Through Trail" linking the three units will be formalized and blazed this summer and trail maps will be made available to the public once the extended system is complete.

We would like to remind those who walk their dogs on Conservation Area trails that dogs should be kept under control and within the owner's sight at all times. Please be considerate and leash your dog when approaching other trail users, and please carry out pet waste. Thank you for your cooperation.

Marlboro Cares encourages our senior residents to take advantage of the fabulous nursing services offered here in town at our Senior Wellness Clinics. The services are free of charge and are provided here in town, close to home. The clinics will continue to be held over the summer on the second Saturday of each month. So join the over 12 people who have already enjoyed this program and feel free to come again.

Susan Kunhardt and other volunteer local nurses offer free-of-charge non-emergency care. They can trim your toenails, take your blood pressure, clean your ears and answer questions about medications, diabetes and glucometers, nutrition, etc. They do not diagnose nor order treatment, but they can consult with you and give excellent advice.

The Senior Wellness Clinics are held at the Marlboro College Health Center from 9 to 11 a.m. Services are by appointment only. Call Marlboro Cares at 258-3030 to make your appointment at least 2 days before the clinic. Transportation is available upon request. The summertime Wellness Clinics will be held July 14<sup>th</sup> and August 11<sup>th</sup>.

The Tai Chi classes with Cielle Tewksbury are in full swing, enjoyed by many of us. If you are between 25 and 105, it is not too late to join the weekly class. The pace is slow and relaxed, with enough repetition to make you comfortable to join in and feel the peace and health benefits. Classes are Thursdays from 5 to 6 pm at the Outback at Marlboro Elementary School.

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**News from the Marlboro College Library**

If you use the Marlboro College Library, you'll want to know that we've made some small changes to loan periods for townspeople and alumni. Books are now due every 30 days. **Please Make Way for Horses (and Other Critters)**

A reminder from your equestrian-riding neighbors about the Vermont Statutes of Motor Vehicles:

(a) Whenever upon a public highway and approaching a vehicle drawn by a draft animal, an animal upon which a person is riding, or animals being herded, the operator of a motor vehicle shall operate the vehicle in such a manner as to exercise every reasonable precaution to prevent the frightening of any animal and to ensure the safety and protection of the animal and the person riding, driving, or herding.

(b) The operator of a motor vehicle shall yield to any animals being herded on or across a highway. (Added 1971, No. 258 (Adj. Sess.), Â§ 3, eff. March 1, 1973; amended 1989, No. 55; 2009, No. 114 (Adj. Sess.), Â§ 5.)
