**Senior Wellness Clinic** – NEW SEPTEMBER DATE: SEPTEMBER 15<sup>TH</sup>

So that everyone can go to the Marlboro Fair, the September Wellness Clinic will be held September 15<sup>th</sup> from 9 to 11 a.m. Marlboro Cares encourages our senior residents to take advantage of the fabulous nursing services offered free of charge here in town at the Health Center at Marlboro College. Services offered include trimming toenails, ear cleaning, blood pressure checks, nutrition advice, and other questions answered. Susan Kunhardt and the other volunteer nurses do not diagnose, nor order treatment, but they can consult with you and give excellent advice. Services are by appointment only. Call Marlboro Cares at 258-3030 to make your appointment at least 2 days before the clinic. Transportation is available upon request. The next Wellness Clinics will be held September 15<sup>th</sup> and October 13<sup>th</sup>.

**Tai Chi classes** – NEW TIME BEGINNING IN SEPTEMBER: 5:15 to 6:15

Tai Ji classes with Cielle Tewksbury are in full swing, enjoyed by many of us. If you are between 25 and 105, you may still join the classes up until the end of September. The pace is slow and relaxed, with enough repetition to make you comfortable to join in and feel the peace and health benefits. No one will be allowed to join the class after September, as there will be too much to learn by then. Classes are Thursdays from 5 to 6 pm at the Outback at Marlboro Elementary School for the remainder of August, then change to 5:15 to 6:15 in September. Cost is \$10 per week, with a sliding scale available by speaking with Cielle.

# Select Board Seeks Help From Fellow Residents to Fill the Membership of the Development Review Board and Planning Commission

The Town needs a larger membership on both the Development Review Board (DRB) and the Planning Commission (PC). The DRB is a board with five members and four alternates. It currently has four members and two alternates.

The DRB is the municipal body authorized and delegated to uphold and interpret the Marlboro Zoning Regulations and Marlboro Subdivision Regulations when required. The Board reviews complete applications for proposed projects at public hearings.

The Planning Commission prepares a municipal plan, zoning bylaws and subdivision regulations, makes recommendations on matters of land development, conservation, and preservation, and participates in a regional planning program.

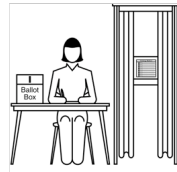
The PC is a nine-member board and currently has a membership of eight, but could really use another person. Present members are often busy in their own jobs and cannot always attend meetings. A full membership would assure not only a necessary

quorum, but also a critical mass to move forward on needed planning issues, including zoning.

Right now the Select Board sees the work by both the Planning Commission and the Development Review Board as of critical importance to the future of our community. We are experiencing a great deal of pressures for growth here in town. Those pressures may be quiet and incremental. However, they are adding up to have a potentially substantial impact on our future here. We encourage any resident with either experience in municipal paid or volunteer work or with simply a sincere interest in being of help to contact us or the Development Review Board and/or the Planning Commission about how you can join. Those Boards would make recommendations to the Select Board for membership appointment.

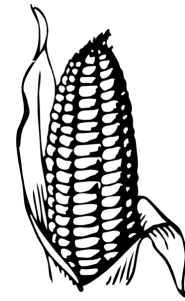
## KELECTION NEWS from Nora Wilson, Town Clerk

Every single write-in vote must be tallied; every tallied vote must be transferred to a summary sheet; and all the data on the summary sheet must be transferred to the Official Return of Votes which must be express- mailed on the day following the election. THE SUMMER SALE REPORT

This year's Summer Sale, our main fundraiser, made a whopping \$4,791. (Clothing: \$1,989 and Treasures: \$1,953.) The Bake Sale brought in a record \$494. THE HURRICANE & THE ALLIANCE: ONE YEAR AFTER

In the aftermath of Irene, Alliance members volunteered in many ways to help Emergency Management meet the needs of community members. Thanks again to everyone who volunteered in small and large ways. A special "Augur Hole Road Edition" of the Mixer was sent with news of volunteer helpers, and an invitation to residents to attend the Fair to meet with FEMA reps.

At the Fair, the Alliance received donations in the Community Tent, and our Volunteer Fire Department generously gave the proceeds of their raffle to our Emergency Fund. In the course of a few weeks, the Alliance received Emergency Fund donations of over \$12,000. In addition, \$5,000 was forwarded by the Vermont Community Foundation from the proceeds of a Phish benefit. Four Alliance volunteers formed a Disaster Fund subcommittee to draft guidelines and determine who most needed help. The aid was a token of help, but substantial enough to be useful and boost morale. A member of the committee also joined the Southeastern Vermont Long-term Recovery committee as a board member. Four businesses of Marlboro residents were helped immediately. One family that lost their home also received a check and donations of clothes and bedding within days of their loss. The committee put in many hours calling, visiting and identifying those in need. One check was returned with the message that it should be given to someone else more in need.

In all, \$15,200 was paid out in 30 separate checks. None of these people asked for help; their need was referred to us by others.

The Alliance also organized support and thanks to the Marlboro Road Crew and its contract helpers. Thank you notes were sent to all the road crew workers and contractors by Marlboro School students. In December we also celebrated the Road Crew at a Potluck, square dance, and fundraiser for a thank-you bonus. One year later, it is amazing how well they've restored and improved our town's roads.

We look back with gratitude and respect for the collective generosity, goodness and grit of our beloved community.

## News From the Poetry Studio by Ann Gengarely

*Creative Writing Classes For Adults Tuesday and Thursday Evenings with Ann Gengarely, 242 Piney Brook Way (off Church Hollow Road)*

Even as many of us are gathering basil to make one more batch of pesto, we are contemplating a change of season. Nature seems to be telling us to “turn inward,” as the poet Rainer Maria Rilke advised, and reflect on the passing of time.

At *The Poetry Studio*, people ranging in age from late twenties to elders gather to “slow down;” to listen to that part of themselves that so easily becomes forgotten in our busy lives. We write and share, remembering *who we are*, for as the Mexican poet, Octavia Paz, claimed: “if we forget poetry, we will forget ourselves.”

Writing poems, stories-- letters to people lost to us-- we create a community that is both intimate and sacred. The poet Denise Levertov writes about experiences “felt by the poet intensely enough ... that he (she) is *brought* to speech.” Again and again we witness how, when someone discovers what it is she *needs* to write about, that person also remembers her authentic voice. Good writing usually springs from necessity: the writer has something he *needs* to say, whether it’s in a poem, a story, a letter.

As Brenda Ueland wrote in *If You Want To Write*, “Everybody is talented because everybody who is human has something to express...” Some people join our community never having written a poem or story. Some have written in private. Many come because they need a space that invites *slowness*, a landscape where whatever material is begging for a voice has a chance to grow. By the end of the evening we all are in awe of not only the writing that has been born, but as importantly, by the deep sense of connection we create by speaking through the unique language of poetry and story. We become witnesses to each others’ inner voices. And in this fast paced world, what a gift that is!

Especially poignant is the community that is born in our adult writing groups. As one participant remarked: “we have the rare opportunity to know one another in ways we never would otherwise.” The particular language of poetry and story invites a knowing often denied in ordinary conversation.

No words can do justice to the depth of our experience at The Poetry Studio: in a world where we can often feel alone and isolated, many discover that in spite of each of us having lived different “stories,” we share similar emotional landscapes. And so we sit together, creating a human circle—a circle of humanity that makes us feel less alone in the world and creates light during the darkest months.

Classes meet on Tuesday evenings beginning November. Classes are also offered on Thursday evenings starting mid-January. For all classes we begin our first circle at 6:15 and end our last circle at 9:00.

## Recycling at the Marlboro Community Fair by Arlene Hanson

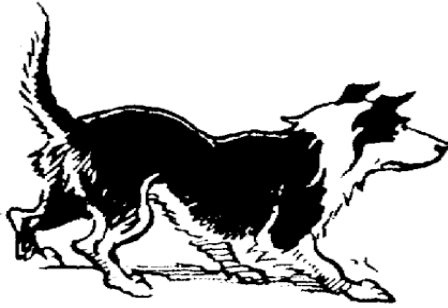

Hello to all Marlboro residents, I'm Adam Katrick, and I was recently appointed by the Select Board to serve as the town's Animal Control Officer (or ACO for short). I have lived in Marlboro since 2003 when I came to study wolf biology and writing at Marlboro College, and my partner and I stayed in town after graduating. I'm an incurable canine nut, a carpenter, and an EMT with the fire department.

During the few short months I've been on the job, I've already assisted with loose hogs on Cowpath 40, resolved an unfortunate dog-bite incident, and reunited a lost dog with his owner. I've also had the opportunity to meet and train with other ACOs in our area.

Even in our small town we have hundreds of domestic animals and even more wild animals – which promises that I shall never have a dull moment! I am here to help anyone in town with animal concerns, whether it be a lost pet or an aggressive dog. In addition, I can connect townsfolk with a network of animal professionals: veterinarians, wildlife specialists, and rescue groups. While it is my job to deal with conflicts and animal emergencies, it is also my duty to share information about where residents can get help with their four-legged friends. No one should hesitate to call me or email me with any questions or concerns.
