## ELECTION NEWS

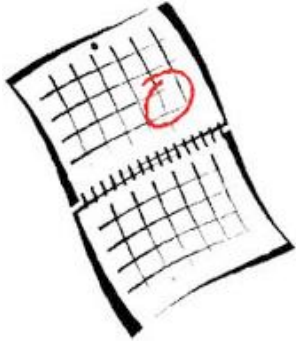
Polling hours are extended for the Presidential Election on **Tuesday, November 6**. The polls will open in the Town Office at **7 AM and will close at 7 PM**.

The deadline for registering to vote is 5 PM on Wednesday, October 31. The Town Clerk keep the office open until that time for last minute registrations.

Early/absentee ballots are available now. You may request a ballot for yourself or a family member up until 4 PM on Monday, November 5. You may vote in person in the office or you may have a ballot mailed to you. Individual voters may pickup their own ballots at the Town Office to vote at home. All ballots must be returned to the Town Clerk by the close of the polls on Election Day.

## The News From MES by Francie Marbury

The Marlboro School Association is in its sixteenth year of supporting Marlboro School by providing resources above and beyond the school budget. These resources make it possible for our public school to provide rich, deep experiences that students remember forever.

Every year the MSA contributes to the Junior High Costa Rica field research. This year the school garden is also receiving funding, as it must be moved to a new location. Field research is an essential element of a Marlboro School education including both the school garden and the trip to Costa Rica. Starting in kindergarten students engage in Outside Works, field research that takes them outside the classroom to learn in the world beyond.

Outside Works follows these guiding principles:

**Quest for Knowledge:** Students will gain the skills to observe and understand the world with a sense of curiosity and wonder.

**Connecting to Place:** Students will explore natural and cultural heritages through excursions and field research.

**Belonging:** Students will develop an active awareness of communities, from the classroom to the world.

**Agency:** Students will develop a positive sense of self and actively contribute to their natural and human communities.

This year, in addition to supporting Outside Works, the MSA is funding a new basketball scoreboard and several new computers. The scoreboard will be dedicated in memory of Jack Hunter, former MES parent and the electrician who kept our old scoreboard functioning for so many years.

Thank you everyone who contributed last year. We hope that when you receive this year's appeal, you'll be moved to continue our community's strong support for the Marlboro School Association.

## The Select Board Report by Marcia Hamilton

The select board meets every second and fourth Thursday at the Town Office, unless otherwise warned. Winter hours are in effect from November through March and the board meets at 4:30 PM.

A reminder to residents: the recycling center is designed to accept paper products, cans and bottles. It is not a dump for large items. When non-recyclable items (such as sinks, tires, air conditioners, oversized children's toys, mattresses) are left there, it is up to volunteers to transport these items to Windham Solid Waste (327 Old Ferry Road, Brattleboro). We feel this is an unfair expectation for volunteer community members and hope that offenders will consider this when leaving inappropriate waste at the recycling bins. General Guideline: If an item does not fit through the opening of the bin, it is not an acceptable item and should not be left in the area of the recycling bins.

The board set November 8 for a site visit and hearing to accept the new portion of Adams Brook Road and swap the old portion with the abutting landowner.

The board filled a vacancy and appointed Staley McDermet to the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission now has its full complement of nine members. Thank you, Staley, for coming forward to serve the Town. The Development Review Board is still looking for a few good people to serve on that board.

The select board also appointed Carie Kowalski as Green Up Coordinator. Green Up Day is May 4, 2013. Thank, you Carie.

The select board accepted Nora Wilson's resignation as Town Clerk effective December 31, 2012 and appointed Forrest Holzapfel Town Clerk effective January 1, 2013 through March 5, 2013, Town Meeting Day, when an election will be held.

The board would like to thank Nora for all of her years of kindness and diligent regard for all of our town's residents, and for her high level of professionalism every day on the job as our Town Clerk. We will miss her. Forrest has served not only as a Lister for the town for many years but in recent years he has served as Assistant Town Clerk.

Marlboro has a new Emergency Management Coordinator, Rusty Sage! A director appoints a coordinator to help with planning for emergencies; Rusty will be coordinating individual training and classes for the Emergency Operations Center staff and other Emergency Management related activities. Rusty is a firefighter in Brattleboro and is also a captain and the training officer for the Marlboro Volunteer Fire Company.

The Neighborhood Networks program is still looking for people to serve as Area Organizers - we have someone for Ames Hill, but we still need people for the areas around Lyman Hill, Green River, Higley Hill, Augur Hole, and North Pond (ideally with alternates). The goal of the program is to have a standing system for sharing reliable information up and down and throughout the town.
